PURPOSE

To ensure that incidents of suspected or known child abuse and neglect, elder and dependentadult abuse, and/or Intimate Partner Violence (Domestic Violence) are reported by the LAC+USC Medical Center as required by federal, State, local laws, and/or other applicable regulations.

POLICY

Types of Violence/Abuse:

- Elder Abuse: is an intentional act or failure to act that causes or creates a risk of harm to an older adult. An older adult is someone age 60 or older. The abuse often occurs at the hands of a caregiver or a person the elder trusts. Common types of elder abuse include, physical, sexual, emotional or psychological, neglect and financial abuse.
- <u>Child Abuse</u> Any recent act or failure to act on the part of a parent or caretaker, which results in death, serious physical or emotional harm, sexual abuse or exploitation; or

Child Neglect - An act or failure to act which presents an imminent risk of serious harm

- A "child" under this definition generally means a person who is younger than age 18 or who is not an emancipated minor
- <u>Domestic Violence or Intimate Partner Violence</u>---means abuse committed against an adult or a fully emancipated minor who is a spouse, former spouse, cohabitant, or person with whom the suspect has had a child or is having or has had a dating or engagement relationship.

Abuse- the intentionally or recklessly causing or attempting to cause bodily injury or placing another person in reasonable apprehension of imminent serious bodily injury to himself or herself, or another.

Physical Abuse- means all of the following as defined in Penal Code (Welfare and Institutions Code Section 15610.63):

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- 1. Assault
- 2. Battery
- 3. Assault with a deadly weapon or force likely to produce great bodily injury or harm 4. Unreasonable physical constraint, or prolonged or continual deprivation of food or
- water.
- 5. Sexual assault, which means any of the following:
- a. Sexual battery
- b. Rape
- c. Rape in concert
- d. Spousal rape
- e. Incest
- f. Sodomy
- g. Oral copulation
- h. Sexual penetration
- i. Lewd or lascivious act
- 6. Use of physical or chemical restrain or psychotropic medication under any of the following conditions:
- a. For punishment
- b. For a period significantly beyond that for which the restraint or medication is authorized by provider.
- c. For any purpose not authorized by the provider.

Employees of the LAC+USC Medical Center have a responsibility to participate in identifying and reporting cases of suspected child abuse and neglect, elder and dependent-adult abuse and Intimate Partner Violence (Domestic Violence).

Any child care custodian, medical practitioner, or non-medical practitioner shall immediately report child abuse and neglect, elder and dependent-adult abuse, and/or Intimate Partner Violence (Domestic Violence) when such abuse is suspected or becomes known while he or she is acting in his or her professional capacity or within the scope of his or her employment.

Mandated reporters include physicians; surgeons; psychiatrists; dentists; nurses; social workers; marriage, family, and child counselors; administrators; employees of State or County public health agencies; and local law enforcement personnel; and others as required by federal, State, local laws, and/or other applicable regulations.

Child abuse and neglect, elder and dependent-adult abuse, and Intimate Partner Violence (Domestic Violence) reporting shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- When the reporter has observed an incident that reasonably appears to be physical abuse.
- When the mandated reporter has observed a physical injury where the nature of the injury, its location on the body, or the repetition of the injury, is suspicious for physical abuse having occurred.

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• When the patient informs the reporter that he or she has been or is currently experiencing abuse or neglect. When the patient reports the infliction, or the threat of infliction, of physical harm (including sexual assault) by an intimate partner.

It is the responsibility of health care practitioners and/or other mandated reporters to ensure that all incidents of suspected or known child abuse and neglect, elder and dependent-adult abuse and/or Intimate Partner Violence (Domestic Violence) are reported in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, policies, and/or procedures.
