#### **PURPOSE**

To provide availability of medical gases for patient care.

### **POLICY**

Facilities Management shall maintain gases for medical use at Los Angeles General Medical Center component sites.

# PROCEDURE PROCEDURE

- Facilities Management shall order, receive, store, inventory, and keep records of all medical gases in bulk and cylinders.
- Facilities Management shall deliver medical gases to wards and other user areas in a safe and timely manner.
- Medical gases will be administered by qualified patient care providers only.
- Preventive maintenance will occur as required by regulatory agencies.
- Major valves and emergency shut-off controls shall be tagged.
- Installation or repairs shall be performed according to code.

## CYLINDER CONNECTIONS

- Make certain that apparatus and cylinder valve connections and cylinder wrenches are free of foreign materials.
- 2. Turn the cylinder valve outlet away from personnel following these safety procedures:
  - Stand to the side not in front and not in back.

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- Before connecting the apparatus to the cylinder valve, momentarily open the cylinder valve to eliminate dust.
- Make connection of the apparatus to the cylinder valve and tighten the connection nut securely with a wrench.
- 4. Release the low-pressure adjustment screw of the pressure reducing regulator completely.
- 5. Slowly open cylinder valve to the full-open position.
- 6. Slowly turn in the low-pressure adjustment screw on the pressure reducing regulator until the proper working pressure is obtained.
- 7. Open the valve to the utilization apparatus.

#### MEDICAL GAS SHUT-OFF PROCEDURES

- 1. Only attending staff, residents, registered nurses, and respiratory care practitioners may shut off or authorize other employees to shut off oxygen ward/clinic/zone shutoff valves.
- 2. If it is necessary to shut off oxygen, ensure that all oxygen dependent patients have alternative means of life support. If oxygen is shut off at the zone/ward/clinic valve, all patients in that zone/ward/clinic will be removed from oxygen.
- 3. Oxygen should only be shut off at the zone/ward/clinic valve when:
  - A fire is being fed by oxygen and is becoming larger.
  - The oxygen cannot be shut off at the bedside without endangerment of life.
- 4. To shut off the oxygen zone/ward/clinic valve:
  - Note the label above or inside the valve box which identifies the rooms that are controlled by that valve.
  - Remove the cover over the valve box. Verify the correct valve to be secured.
  - For those with flat handle valves, grasp handle and rotate ¼ turn; for those with round handle valves, turn handle clockwise until it stops.
- Call Facilities Management to turn the valve on again. Be sure to identify which valves were turned off.
