SUBJECT/TITLE: HIMS-DO NOT RESUSCITATE ORDER

POLICY: This policy is to establish guidelines for reporting Do Not Resuscitate (DNR)

orders required by the State of California Office of Statewide Health

Planning and Development (OSHPD).

PURPOSE:

DEFINITIONS: A Do Not Resuscitate order is a directive from a physician in a patient's

medical record indicating that the patient is not to be resuscitated in the event of a cardiac or pulmonary arrest. Resuscitative measures include, but are not limited to the following: cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), intubation, defibrillation, cardioactive drugs, or assisted ventilation.

PROCEDURE: The Medical Record Coder is required to answer "yes" or "no" in the

Hospital Information System, Medical Records Abstract/Abstract module on

all inpatients regarding DNR orders.

HOSPITAL CARE AND RESUSCITATION

The following procedure is for inpatients during their current admission.

- 1. The DNR order can be written on the progress note or on a DNR form.
- 2. Indicate "yes" if the DNR order was written at the time of admission or within the first 24 hours of admission.
- 3. Degree of DNR order can be a single measure or a combination of two or more measures.
- 4. When a DNR order is written at admission or within the first 24 hours of admission and is discontinued, report as a "yes"
- 5. When a DNR order is written at admission or within the first 24 hours of admission and is discontinued before discharge and another DNR order

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written some time later, only the first order is reported "yes".

- 6. A written DNR can be used if a patient was transferred from within our hospital, Ambulatory Surgery, or Clinic as long as the DNR was written within 24 hours of admission, written as a transfer note, and written by one of our physicians.
- 7. It is a "no" if a patient was transferred from another hospital emergency room to our emergency room with a written DNR. It is only acceptable when a physician from our hospital staff writes the order.
- 8. Indicate "no" if the DNR order was written on a previous admission. The order can only be used for the current admission.
- 9. Advance Directives or Living Will cannot take the place of the DNR order. The physician must write the DNR order.
