**SUBJECT:** NEWBORN EXAMINATION & CARE

POLICY NO. 325

PURPOSE::

To provide a comprehensive plan for newborn examination and care to all DHS

hospitals.

POLICY::

To ensure that newborns of DHS health facilities receive a uniform standard of care, each hospital shall adopt the following policy:

- All newborns shall be delivered with accessibility to at least one staff person, who at a minimum, has successfully completed a course in infant resuscitation.
- 2. Adequate resuscitation equipment (as defined by AAP) shall be immediately available for newborns in the delivery room.
- There shall be a minimum of two staff present (with a minimum of one staff member having successfully completed a course in infant resuscitation) for all high-risk deliveries.
- 4. Each newborn shall be initially assessed immediately after delivery. This assessment will include Apgar scores at one and five minutes, birth weight and examination for gross congenital anomalies.
- 5. A complete assessment of a newborn shall be done by a qualified professional as soon after delivery as possible, covering the elements (including imperforate anus) contained in POPRAS 12 [attached]. Each facility will have written procedures for completing the necessary exams.
- 6. First passage of stool and urine shall be noted prior to discharge.
- 7. Ana patency will be assured by either examination, passing of a pediatric NG tube, or a rectal temperature.
- 8. All newborns shall be maintained under skilled observation until a complete history and physical are performed.
- 9. The standard genetic screens shall be performed as mandated by law.
- 10. The administration of Vitamin K will be performed as required by law.
- 11. Eye care will be provided in accordance with State law.
- 12. Standard test for syphilis will be performed on mother at delivery and on cord blood (where indicated).
- 13. Hepatitis B surface antigen testing shall be done at the time of the first prenatal visit. If the mother's status is unknown at the time of delivery, a high risk maternal screen will be performed (as detailed in Public Health Letter Vol. 10, No. 3, March 1988). Those babies of high risk mothers will receive Hepatitis B immune globulin and vaccine within the first 24 hours.

14. All procedures will be in accordance with California State Law and JCAHO.
